#### REFEREES REPORT

The Association would like to take this opportunity of congratulating the three unions and the schools on the undoubted success of their various competitions and as an ancilliary body of each of these organizations we do not think it is presumptious on ourpart to hope that we have contributed in some small way to an outstanding season of rugby.

Shortage of active members together with but to a much lesser extent, the amount of travel involved, were again a matter of grave concern to the association. For the full period of the school mid-term we were regularly refereeing 42 games per weekend (approximately  $\frac{1}{2}$  Saturday and  $\frac{1}{2}$  Sunday) with an average availability of 20 each day, and although 25 of our members were active throughout the season not all of these can turn out on both Saturday and Sunday with the result that 3 games per weekend are a common occurrence for many of our referees.

It is probably not fully realised how far our area of activity extends and the amount of travel involved, but our commitments regularly extend along a 120 mile strip from Toowoomba to Scarborough and indeed on one memorable Saturday this season the thin WHITE line was spread out as follows:

Toowoomba (2); Gatton; Amberley 2; Ipswich; Southport; Tingalpa; Runcorn; Bald Hills; Deagon; Scarborough; Brisbane City.

Some members do not have transport while others are not financially able to undertake the longer trips and although travelling expenses are available on demand the Association's resources are such that this assistance is only a token nature.

In excess of 40 lectures were given during the year to various rugby bodies including daily attendance at week long "Rugby teach-ins" at two schools. Coaching at both theoretical and field level was given to referees from North Queensland (3) and Darling Downs (5) all of whom were sufficiently interested

to come to Brisbane for this purpose. A particularly successful weekend lecture tour was made of Toowoomba and Warwick and it was heartening to find referees in attendance from as far afield as Goondiwindi and Moree (N.S.W.)

The lack of mixing by referees with the players and club officials after their game is a matter of disappointment to the association but it must be realised that the very nature of our function in rugby means that the majority of our members are mature men with domestic responsibilities and after two nights out during the week on Association activities followed by refereeing on Saturday afternoon and again either Sunday morning or afternoon most very naturally feel they should return home as soon as possible. An increase in active members would of course alleviate the situation but this will undoubtedly take time to overcome.

We look forward to another very full and enjoyable season in 1970.

# Report of the Appointments Board for 1969

Members of the Appointments Board faced a difficult task in 1969. Not only were there, at the height of the season, some forty games for which referees had to be found from a pool which fluctuated around twenty-five available referees but the Board also came under criticism from members about the grading

of referees, and from the QRU concerning the allegedly poor quality of some referees. The QRU also made impossible requests concerning the allocation of "good" referees - to First Grade Games, to the Under 19 grade as these are the players of the future, ignoring the shortage of "good" referees and the need to supply adequately experienced refereed to GPS and TAS fixtures.

With the numbers as they are members of the Appointments Board (like active Referees) need ideally to be celibate with no family responsibilities and no business or other interests which may prevent them from dedicating the whole of each week-end to Rugby Union if they are to carry out conscientiously the duties of assessing and advising referees on the quality of their games and of instructing new recruits. The Board met weekly, but only the Chairman, Mr. Clark, consistently attended, as other members occasionally had business commitments. That few games were delayed by the failure of a referee to appear was due in large measure to Mr. Clark's thorough records of availability and meticulous follow-up of any possible hitches.

Fundamental changes are required in the organisation for appointments and training. There were demands from members for regular grading; this the Board was unwilling to do publicly as it was clear from discussions at meetings that few members have a realistic conception of their own performance and public grading would involve the Board in a large amount of personal discussion and embarrassment, In fact for its own purposes the Board maintained a loose grading into three classes with some mobility between these classes as circumstances warranted. For instance geographical location of grounds and inconvenience to members can be an important factor. The Board is also reluctant to involve members with family responsibilities in an early Sunday morning fixture. The Board came under criticism for appointing other than a few select referees to First Grade games whereas it was actually attempting to give experience to certain referees in games which had no chance of influencing the First Grade competition itself.

The only real solution to the Board's problems is either a reduction in the number of games for which appointments are made or an increase in membership to a situation where the Board is not faced with compromise in order to avoid losing members. This is really tied in with a need to give adequate training to new members and satisfactory regular assessment to regular members, and a change in player's views

of referees which will encourage more players to take up refereeing.

In relation to training it is desirable that new referees should have practical field training before being awarded a badge. As a suggestion a candidate, after passing his oral exam, might referee three games under the guidance of two experienced referees one of whom would be a member of the Board. By arrangement with the players the supervisors might give advice once or twice during the game as well as at half-time.

A small number of experienced referees might be nominated by the Management Committee to assist the Board with these duties and with regular supervision and assessment of the performance of ordinary members. It is not suggested that these associates would take part in the allocation of games.

Improvement of the image of the referee is a more difficult matter which the Association cannot solve from its own resources entirely. Hostility of players to referees is a peculiarly Australian phenomenon, possibly carried across from professional codes where the referee is a paid official and not a lover of the game who sacrifices his own time to enable thirty players to enjoy a game of rugby union. Management Committee should enlist the assistance of the QRU in a public relations campaign to emphasise these aspects of refereeing, and individual referees ought probably to mix a lot more with players. These activities and a real improvement in refereeing standards should eventually solve membership problems and make for a stronger and more efficient Association. Board members could play their part more efficiently if they were ex-officio members of the Management Committee.
