PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1982

The year became one of our busiest ever. Refereeing commenced on a trial game basis in late February and finished the first week in October with the Barbarian Game.

Australian Society Activities commenced in February and a run-down of their activities are detailed elsewhere in this report.

We were again involved in coaching through the Development Committee but not to the same extent as in the past. Tony Duffy visited Townsville, Kevin Crowe Rockhampton and as the Country Carnival was held at Ballymore this year members of our appointments board were able to view and talk with some country referees. On a business trip to Cairns I was able to meet members of the Cairns Association which is in its infancy but full of enthusiasm.

The Country Referees Association continues to operate. It however covers an enormous territory making communication difficult. Hopefully with greater effort on our part we will be able to assist and guide in a more tangible way.

The interchange program is tabulated elsewhere in this report. The program was the largest and most successful yet.

In the representative arena there were some undoubted highlights. Col Waldron travelled to Fiji to officiate in three tests between Somoa, Tonga and Fiji and become the first Queensland referee to referee internationals outside Australia. With the commencement of independent referees for all Test matches in 1983, opportunities now exist overseas. Kerry Fitzgerald had the game between Scotland and Victoria in Melbourne, his first such appointment at this level outside the State.

Col and Kerry together with Chris Oxenford and Tony Duffy handled all the major rep. matches. 'Well done' to them.

The highlight of the year was the dinner for Kevin Crowe. The dinner attended by many of his friends was a memorable one and Kevin's reminiscences of Rugby's early days were a treat for those of us who are of a younger vintage. Our Special guest was the Hon. Brian Austin and it was a pleasure to have him with us.

The club competition as it has in the past couple of seasons was not without its moments of controversy. Our members officiated at over 750 games this year and one would be an "ostrich" if he did not think that in such a large number or games there would be errors. I feel referees have been ready to acknowledge their errors and the occasions when they have had a 'bad' game.

What concerns me is the attitude of Clubs and teams throughout the grades who have made the referee the 'Scapegoat' for their performances. We have had a loss in members during the year and many referees have complained of the abuse they have received from coaches and players alike following matches. If there is no enjoyment for the referee we can hardly expect to attract recruits. Very few ex-players from clubs become referees. Perhaps they have seen the treatment dished out and want no part of it.

The number of send-offs in U. 19's and 18's is also worrying. The boys obviously need leadership and direction in their responsibilities when playing this game we value so much. Referees do not start or participate in foul play, they are only expected to end it. Perhaps clubs should discipline players sent off?

Whilst the foregoing may seem dismal, I hasten to add that it applies to less than 10% of games and referees would like to thank all those club officials and supporters who have made them welcome and assisted them with their duties.

Planning and fund raising for our meeting rooms occupied a considerable part of our seasons activities. At the present time we are awaiting council approval of the plans. This approval represents the last obstacle. When obtained building can commence, and we should be able to use them from the beginning of the 1983 Season. The full extent of our financial commitment is not yet known, but it will require your support over the next year or so to erase.

Finally one last comment on the years activities. Much of the work of this Association is done by a few people. In a season where I was not able to be an active referee, I was able to spend more time talking with you all. The frustrations and disappointments of many referees were obvious and on occasions this led to bitterness. It was particularly difficult

to motivate members in assisting with fund raising, ushering etc. Some of us did not sell one raffle ticket yet we expect someone to provide us with the finance for a meeting room. On one occasion to fulfill our ushering commitments we had to call on outsiders and wives. It was then frustrating for me to see many who could have helped, enjoying the hospitality of the association after the game. Gentlemen, we have a good, sound association. With a little more participation by us all we can have a group of which we can be proud.

I would like to thank the Appointments Board, all members of the various sub-committees, the Junior Referees, the Q.R.U., the A.S.S.R. and our sponsors for their help during the year.

To my own Committee, thank you for your support. Whilst we did not all agree on all matters, the various views expressed were representative of all members and assisted in sound decision making.

This completes my three year term as your President. The friendships made and your support has made it a very rewarding and growing experience for me. I urge you to give the incomming President the same support.

Thank you all very much and best of luck with your refereeing in 1983.

FUND RAISING

Little has been said in our reports regarding fund raising, however in the past year we have managed to accumulate \$5000.00.

Of this figure \$2000.00 has come from ushering and approximately \$1700.00 from this years Grand Final raffle. The balance has accumulated from doubles and minor raffles.

All ushers are to be congratulated and thanks to Richard Bendeich and Greg Howard the raffle money has been raised.

Our thanks should also go to Mike Mac Donald of Swift and Moore and Don Greentree of Chandlers. These gentlemen and their companies have been our first tangible sponsors for some time.

More will be required in 1983 to pay off the meeting rooms, please help.

SOCIALS

Beside the usual hospitality following 'big matches' a number of dinners were held to entertain visiting referees. They were well attended and mention was made that we should do more in this area in 1983. Anyone for the Social Committee?

Our annual Dinner was a success as was the Kevin Crowe Appreciation Dinner mentioned elsewhere in this report.

The cricket match against the Juniors was a raging success. Although beaten, we were a good side out of luck. Revenge is being sought on February 6th, 1983.

THE AUSTRALIAN SOCIETY OF RUGBY REFEREES

The Society commenced their activities in February this year with their bi-annual conference in Adeliade. Special guests were Michael Hawker (1981/82 Wallaby) and Tom Doocey (New Zealand Test Referee). Main discussion centred around the implementation of the "new tackle law".

The Society's President Kevin McGregor visited Brisbane shortly after to present the Society's 1982 Seminar program. This was a follow-up to the course run Australia wide in 1981. Referees from the South-East corner of Queensland attended the all-day seminar at the Marist College at Ashgrove.

Three committee meetings have been held in Sydney and matters of major interest are:

Queensland now have two delegates to the Australian Society.

A further semimar for referees will be held in 1983.

A seminar for Appointments Board will hopefully be conducted in 1983.

The New Zealand Rugby Referees have been approached through the National Bodies with the view to exchanging referees at a high level. (eg. Interstate and Ranfurly Shield)

The affiliation fee structure is being looked into. Further experience visits to the United Kingdom for promising referees are envisiaged.

The Secretary of the Society Ron Nicolle represented the Society at the Kevin Crowe Dinner and it is pleasing to see the Society acknowledge the contribution that this referee has made to the game of Rugby.

The annual meeting of the Society will be held in Sydney next February when the matter of fees and venue for the next conference should be decided.

AUSTRALIAN LAWS COMMITTEE

There were two meetings during the season. The first was mainly concerned with recommendations to the A.R.U. for law changes to be presented to the I.R.B. meeting next year. These concerned an amendment to the tackle law to allow a tackled player to pass the ball immediately; the introduction of official time keepers; a variation to the off side law in general play; a recommendation that penalty kicks be awarded only for infringements of Law 24 and 26 and all other infringements be free kicks; the points scored for a drop goal be reduced to 2.

At the second meeting the recommendations from all the major I.R.B. countries were considered and comments forwarded to the A.R.U. There appears to be general agreement that the number of penalty offences should be decreased and free kick offences increased, with a possible reduction of points scored for a field goal. Also there was a general recommendation to change the tackle law.

There are some law changes for the 1983 Season and these include :-

- (A) <u>Scrummage</u>. No scrum is to be formed within 5 metres of the touch line. A minimum of 5 players from each team must form the scrummage. No outside player, other than the prop may hold an opponent. When deciding who puts the ball into the scrum, the final option is now the attacking team, <u>not</u> the defending. The referee should not permit the front rows to close until the ball is available to be put into the scrum.
- (B) <u>Lineout</u>. The ball must be thrown in without delay or feint. The 'furtherest player' concept has been eliminated. The distance restraints still apply.
- (C) Offside. In general play, the ten metre circle applies to the place where the ball pitches as well as the player waiting to catch the ball. In a wheeling scrummage, any player whose position in the scrummage is such that his feet represent the hindmost feet in that scrummage, is permitted to detach and pick up the ball.
- (D) Free Kick. The penalty for an infringement by the opposing team is a penalty advanced ten metres (not at the mark as now).

It has been realized by most countries that the change to the lineout law virtually eliminates short lineouts. An urgent recommendation has been put to the I.R.B. to ammend this, to allow the team throwing in the ball to determine the number in the lineout.

COACHING ADMINISTRATORS REPORT

OBJECTIVES :

The objectives of the Coaching Committee were to:-

- 1. Provide direction and guidance for all members, balancing improvement and enjoyment toward their respective goals.
- 2. Review and monitor the standard of refereeing within the Association.
- 3. Maintain a consistant interpretation of Laws within the Association.
- 4. To provide training facilities for interested referees on all facets of on-field participation, concepts and assessment techniques.
- 5. Promote to Clubs, Associated Rugby Bodies and Committees, the aims and the role of referees, indicating areas with which they can help.

The purpose of this report is to attempt to assess the success of the Coaching Committee's Programs, in respect to achieving the abovementioned 'terms of reference'.

PROGRAMS :

The nucleus of the new system was a dramatic restructuring of the Associations Meeting format. On-field coaching demonstrations provided a necessary practical component of refereeing situations. The meetings were more frequent at the commencement of the season and tailed-off towards the end; where traditionally attendences are low. Eminating from this core were the following associated programs designed to consolidate the objectives of standardisation, direction etc.

- (a) Club Reporting System.
- (b) Lecture/Coaching Demonstrations.
- (c) Sighting and Assessment of Members.
 - (d) Club Liason Activities.
 - (e) Law Standards Committee

The difference between success and failure largely depend on the unity of members providing direction towards common objectives, a need for strong association with steadfast attitude and a professional image was paramount.

SUCCESSES:

At the representative level a Big Two' dominated the scene for many years making it difficult for a referee to progress through the ranks. Although it may be argued that our top five referees are not as experienced as they have been in the past, it is undeniable that the top twenty-five are of much higher standard.

The Club Reporting System provided a weekly assessment of referees. The information generated would enable efficient allocation of Coaching Panel Members to review individual referees, maintain standards and highlight any 'problem areas' which the Association is not concious of.

The Coaching and Lecture Program was partially successful. The subject areas were well presented and generated discussion. We have at last progressed from 'reading the law book lectures'. The joint presentation of coaching material made the lectures informative and the demonstrations effective. If all people involved in the Coaching and lecture program could have written a small paper we would now have a tremendous basis for an Introductory Coaching Manual.

FAILURES:

The Association still lacks unity, although there exists more than there has in the past. Unfortunately we do not see the priority of helping others to be important. As long as there is the "what's in it for me" and "the Appointments Board Bitch" Syndrome we will never come of age.

We have not improved our image on the Club level. Whether they were asked or not <u>Club Liason referees</u> did little to promote the position of referees within the rugby community. If the Club didn't approach us we sure as hell wouldn't approach them.

The Sighting Panel Members performed very poorly. The total reports compiled was far below the target. Thank goodness the Appointments Board saved them from a humiliating situation. As in past years little direction was provided for members. The job of the Law Standards Committee was to CONSOLIDATE rulings, resolve any problem areas referred by the Club Reports, the Club Liason Referees or the Sighting Panel Members and maintain Association Standards. The Committee only met once. Although its decisions were timely they were not monitored.

OVERVIEW:

After analysing the programs and the activities of the Q.R.R.A. and its members, it comes as no surprise to me that our Association was openly criticised by some Clubs and in the Media. A lack of unity and pride for our Association was the downfall. I would not expect a President to defend the Members of an Association who themselves had done so little during the year. The most important areas of Club Liason, Referee Sighting Reports and Law Standardisation were virtually ignored. A 'handful of referees' should not do the entire Association's work. As referees, we are a vital part of the game and our contribution transcends the responsibilities for eighty minutes on a Saturday afternoon. If we had attempted to fulfill the objectives of the coaching plan (which every member received) I am sure we would be receiving more respect as an Association. A professional image requires a professional attitude.

Ushering at a game you would be attending anyway and downing a few free beers behind the Chip Shop afterwards is a very long way from the duties of a referees Association responsible for the conduct of play in what is possibly the greatest Rugby Playing 'Province' in the World.

EXAMINATION BOARD REPORT

1982 saw a lot of early activity for members of the Board. In the off season the theory paper was rewritten to incorporate new law changes and to modify the old theory paper introduced a number of years ago by Max Turrell.

During the year a plan was introduced where by clubs supplied a representative to sit for our badge and thus be qualified to run the line. This was done to try and take some of the pressure off our members in doubling up on games. Most clubs now have a qualified touch judge.

This year saw about twelve new members sit for their Senior Badge, but with the drop off of members during the season, the new intake was not enough to fill the games at the height of the season.

The schools now have their own Badge and run their own courses. This has taken some of the burden off our committee to mark dozens of papers. We are now used as consultants to the schools.

As I said last year in my report, we still need members to keep an active campaign up to get new referees to join our association. The game is growing and so we must grow with it.

I would like to thank my fellow board members, Peter Galloway, Barry Leask and Bernie Fienberg for their help this season in marking papers and field testing new referees.

I would like to thank Ian Scotney and his management Committee for their support during the season.

The rapport between our Association and the Club Delegates within this Committee was particularly good and it is hoped that this relationship will become stronger in years to come.

APPOINTMENT BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The members of the Board for the past season John Dowsett, Phil Jones, Cec Menzies as secretary and myself were a most harmonious panel. We attended twenty meetings to make appointments plus travelling at least one day of the week and quite often two days to watch referees. My personal thanks must go to Cec Menzies for the staunch job done in replacing referees who cannot fill appointments 80% of which were notified at a very late date. Non availability is one aspect of refereeing which has not changed over the years. Never the less we are most fortunate to have three or four referees who will turn out at short notice. Many thanks to those concerned.

The Q.R.U. panel was most co-operative. Our relationship with them has improved 99% since I first became Chairman in 1975 and I see no reason for this to change in future seasons.

We were most concerned regarding critisism of appointments. Not once did we receive an official notice referring to a wrong appointment. If there was a case of a lower grade referee getting a higher grade game there was always a reason. No one ever asked, only critised.

Refereeing:

The standard of the past season was mediocre and there was a reason for this. Firstly,
we do not have enough about refereeing at our
meetings. What we need is questions and
answers, not lectures read from a law book.
We do not judge referees entirely on how well
they know the laws. There are other aspects,
appearance, fitness, whistle, signals, approach,
advantage and positional refereeing. The following are a few glaring instances not being
attended to by all referees top to bottom:-

- (1) When a touch judge reports a player to a referee he starts play with a scrum.
- (2) Players not making the ball available to the opposition at lineouts, scrums, penalties etc.

- (3) Defending backs infringing the off-side line.
- (4) Halfbacks not putting the ball in correctly and wasting time.
- (5) Not enough attention being paid to key jumpers in lineout.
- (6) Not knowing the definition of a knock on.
- (7) Players joining or moving into rucks and mauls in an off side position.

Grading:-This is the most difficult decision the appointboard has to make. There are so many referees of the same standard particularly from second grade down. Everybody wonders how Mr. X a third grade referee gets a second grade game. Commonsense prevails. He must get a go at second grade or how can he improve. Once again I must quote "a world problem with refereeing is that it is a very jealous from of relaxation. It should not be, but unfortunately is, always has been and always will be. We are very much aware of this fact by comments from referees regarding fellow referees. We do endeavour to give all referees a "fair go". Should you feel otherwise you should approach the board and discuss your problem.

The classification panel did not function as well as expected. Perhaps the appointment board was partly to blame for not persuing this issue.

New Referees: I feel these members are not being looked after well enough. The association takes their money, someone puts them through a test, they are introduced at a meeting and from then on they are on their own, most noticeably. If we are to keep new referees the association must appoint a referee with full knowledge of the association, who knows all members and can make the new member feel at home with the Q.R.R.A.

Congratulations to all referees who controlled major games, especially Col Waldron for his appointment to three test games in Fiji and also those selected to go to New Zealand and N.S.W. Also to referees who visited associations outside Brisbane.

Many thanks must go to Richard Bendiech for the fentastic number of hours he must have put in compiling the results of the feedback from clubs.

In the past it has been a pleasure to thank the members of the Q.R.U. Office for their co-operation. Unfortunately this cannot be said of the past season. If it had not been for Cec Menzies, many weekend games would not have had referees. He even drew up the appointment sheets and many times his daughter typed in the names. Cec is not paid by the Q.R.U. The incoming committee should investigate the matter and make sure there is not a repetition of the mistakes made last season.

The statistics are being compiled by the executive committee.

It is with great pleasure that I present the Eleventh Annual Report of the Queensland Junior Rugby Referees' Association.

The Association's activities have expanded during 1982. This expansion has gone hand in hand with the consolidation necessary to ensure success.

Membership has been steady during the season, mainly due to an early influx of new referees. It has been encouraging that so many new members have come from the clubs; this has historically been an area slow to yield referees. Perhaps our member problem is well on the way to being solved.

The season began with the obligatory draw difficulties which, in spite of many attempts to the contrary, continued throughout the season. The solution to this problem may be difficult, but must be found if Junior Rugby is to continue on its current high note.

I must once again express my appreciation for the help, sponsorship and co-operation of the Q.J.R.U. Management Committee and Council during 1982. My thanks also go to the Q.R.R.A. for their support and co-operation.

The R.M.Bendeich Trophy for the most senior Grand Final was awarded to Mr Andrew Cole for the Under 16 agegroup; congratulations again, Andrew.

The Trevor Henry Memorial Trophy for outstanding service to and for tha Association was awarded to Mr Fred Crawford; congratulations again, Fred.

The Cecil Menzies Shield for the most improved referee was a new award this year. After the votes of eight senior members of the Association were counted, the shield was awarded to Mr B.McCosker, Miss A.Paterson, and Mr W.Pratt.

Miss Susan Gibson represented the Association in the Miss Q.J.R.U. Quest. Sue won the quest and supported both us and the Q.J.R.U. throughout the season. I thank her for her support.

Before I close, I wish to record my thanks to Mr David Russell and his firm, Country Style Bakeries, for their support during 1982. The ladies behind the scenes who keep everything and everyone moving smoothly must also be thanked.

Finally I would like to thank the Management Committee and the members of all boards and committees of the Association for their efforts in 1982.
