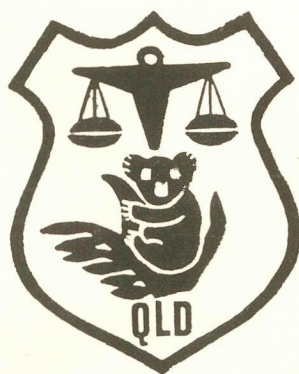

## R E P O R T

### QUEENSLAND RUGBY REFEREES ASSOCIATION FOR 1984

This year is my final year as President of your Association. I joined the Association nine years ago and held the position of Secretary for four years and President for two years.

I have either played or coached the game for most of my life so that I came from an environment where Rugby was essentially a team game to an association of men who are on the field every weekend as arbiters. That position can be a very lonely one and so Referees dearly need the support of their fellow Referees.

This year, I have found that the Referees of this Association are supporting one another very very well and this is particularly so in the Senior ranks. This support must be there for a happy association and I am grateful to the Senior Referees of our Association particularly, in this regard.

We again interchanged with Canterbury, Hamilton and Sydney. Bernie Fiernberg and Peter Bechtel went to New Zealand and Barry Leask and Joe Carter to Sydney. In addition to having Referees from these centres in Brisbane, we also welcomed Referees from Canberra, Townsville and Rockhampton. It is hoped to continue all these interchanges next year and continue with the scheme of bringing Country Referees to Brisbane in the year. Phil Jones from our Classification Committee and Ted Apted from our Senior Panel went to Rockhampton and Mt. Isa respectively.

During the year we welcomed Roger Quittenton to Brisbane. Mr. Quittenton gave our Referees one of the best talks our Association has ever heard and it is of great benefit to our Association to have International Referees visit us and referee amongst us.

In 1984, three of our Referees were on the Australian Referees panel. They were Kerry Fitzgerald, Col Waldron and Chris Oxenford. Kerry Fitzgerald was invited to referee the Hong Kong 7's and was given the Grand Final. Chris Oxenford was asked by the Australian Rugby Union to go to Darwin for the Australian Schools Carnival. At the time of writing this report I have been advised that Kerry Fitzgerald has been invited to referee the Match Fiji -v- The All Blacks.

Great emphasis was put on the lecture programme. Thanks to the Lectures Committee, I think that the lecture programme this year was the best that I have known in the last nine years.

Our Senior Referees had two meetings with the "A" Grade Coaches on a formal basis. However, I would like to see a greater use made by the clubs of our Referees, many of whom are available to attend club training nights.

Our relationship with the press has not been the best this year. We are not able to react against criticism by the press and I like Referees to keep as low a profile as possible. The comments regarding the integrity of some of our Referees by one paper was not appreciated. An occasional word of praise for a job well done would not go amiss.

We have had good relationships with the Queensland Rugby Union and we thank Mr. Norbert Byrne and Mr. Terry Doyle for their assistance during the year, however we are disappointed at the lack of provision for Referees Dressing Rooms at Ballymore. The previous room which had been furnished by the Referees, over a number of years, was demolished to provide for further office extensions at the beginning of the season.

Our association with the clubs this year has been good, and I thank Club Officials for involving the Referees in the after-match functions.

During the year, the Referees Association has been self-supporting and has provided ushers for the major games for the Q.R.U. The new club rooms have been paid off. I would like to thank my Executive Committee and the various Sub-Committees for the excellent work which they have done this year.

## APPOINTMENT BOARD REPORT - SEASON 1984

Until Tony Duffy left Brisbane for Darwin in Mid-August he, as Chairman, made all the appointments himself. Because of the variations in Law to be applied to senior games on the one hand and Under 19 games on the other, it was his policy to apply a system of appointing which included a two weekly cycle - two senior games followed by two Under 19 games. As far as I am aware that was acceptable to most people.

It is unfortunate, however, that no matter what policy had been adopted, it would not have been possible to operate it with more than partial success simply because of late withdrawals some of which, I am sure, could have been notified earlier and some of which seemed to indicate that refereeing for the Association was not always given top priority. This not only altered the balance of the system but, also, caused an enormous amount of work for the Secretary, and those who stood in for him from time to time. It is often surprising just how many telephone calls are necessary in order to replace one referee, to say nothing of the hours of waiting by the telephone for what turn out to be negative replies. When there are six, eight or ten withdrawals necessitating not only replacements but, often, re-arrangement of other appointments also, the task is enormous - and it is just as onerous to replace touch judges as referees. Even Grand Final weekend was not exempt there being four changes from the original very short list.

We are, therefore, very fortunate in having Ces Menzies who, yet again, not only took on all this work but performed it most efficiently and with cheerful resignation. We owe him and his wife, Iris, a considerable debt of gratitude which we could never fully express.

Tony, who was unable to watch referees himself, based his knowledge of them on gradings supplied to him by the Classification Committee. It was this information which enabled him to provide opportunities for a few referees to be given higher grade games from time to time with, for the most part, some success.



Tony was thanked for his services at the last meeting he attended but I am happy to record those thanks here.

When he left I was appointed to succeed him as Chairman at a rather crucial time - two rounds of fixtures to be played followed by four weeks of Finals. The appointments,

however, were not made by me alone although I take full responsibility for them. I was fortunate in having Murray McNae join me on the Appointments Board and we made them together based on our knowledge of referees as members of the Classification Committee. We were also pleased to have the support of John Forbes, the only other member of that committee, when making the Grand Final appointments.

It is not the function of this Board to comment on the quality of refereeing generally or of individual referees other than to say we were never made aware of any complaints so we are left to assume appointments were fairly accurately made and everyone was satisfied. I would, therefore, thank all members for the quality of their performance and especially those who fulfilled every appointment given to them, including those given at short notice. This includes those members of the Junior Association who helped us out from time to time and to whom I offer our thanks.

Appointments to representative games in Queensland were made by the Queensland Rugby Union Appointments Board, under the Chairmanship of Norbert Byrne, and on which this Board was strongly represented. I am pleased to record that a happy association existed between the two bodies which is surely represented by the appointments made. I believe it is very important that there should be a good rapport between each of these two bodies and also the Australian Rugby Union Appointments Board since, albeit at different levels, we are all concerned with the development, selection and appointments of the same referees. An exchange of notes, opinions and ideas from time to time would, I believe, benefit us all but especially the referees.


Also, during the season, we entertained an unusually large number of visiting referees headed by Roger Quittenton from England. All of them were found suitable appointments albeit sometimes with difficulty. Our thanks are due to those members who sacrificed games for them.

In May both Murray and I attended an Australian Society Conference for members of Appointments Boards, in Sydney, the outcome of which was to develop a uniform system of assessing and reporting on referees which, presumably, will now come into operation next season. I was privileged to open the Conference with a paper on 'What makes a good referee? What are we looking for?'

Finally, I would like thank all referee members, members of the Executive Committee, my colleagues on the

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Classification Committee, members of the Ballymore office staff and those who have assisted in some way with the making of appointments during the season, for their much appreciated help.

We held six official meetings during the Season, plus many discussions at various times.

Unfortunately, J. Dowsett and R. Elmer were unable to fulfil their obligations owing to business commitments.

The following no. of referees were assessed:-

P. Jones	Submitted 65 reports
M. McNae	Submitted 48 reports
J. Dowsett	Submitted 3 reports
J. Forbes	Watched 42 & gave verbal reports only

We had only 12 written reports from senior referees. Apart from the above written reports, many referees were seen and verbal reports were given.

The problem (not a new one) re Classification Boards is the lack of personnel to assess all referees at least twice in one Season. For the first time in many years, we did endeavour to see new and lower grade referees. Many first year and ex-junior association referees showed they have the ability to become first class referees, as long as they do not become lazy after two or three years refereeing.

### Grading:-

I must reiterate my comments of 1982. This is the most difficult decision to make, there are so many referees of the same standard particularly from second grade down, the most common comment is "How did so & so get a second grade game, he is only a third grade referee". Commonsense prevails. He must get a go at the higher level or how can he improve?

All my time as an active referee, I was aware that the big problem with refereeing is, it is a very jealous form of relaxation. It should not be, but unfortunately is, always has been and always will be. I was no exception. We do endeavour to give all referees "a fair go". If referees don't think so, 99% of the time it is jealousy - believe it or not.

### Appointment Board

For an Association with the number of referees we have, I feel that Classification and Appointment Boards should be one and the same, particularly when it is hard to get retired referees to become involved.

### Refereeing

This standard during the past Season was very good particularly at senior level. Many of our referees are concerned re: criticism. At this point, may I explain that referees will always be criticised by the losing side (90% of the time), also by captains, coaches, supporters and to my amazement, fellow referees. Don't be disturbed by obnoxious remarks. Unfortunately, this is a world wide trait.

Faults observed by John Forbes over the Season:-

1. Watch positions at line-outs and scrums near try line. Don't stand or run round open side.
2. Check forwards stepping into offside positions while ball being thrown into line-out.
3. Many referees of all grades still are hesitant about controlling foul play.
4. Lower grade referees should be positioned further from rucks and mauls.

Faults I considered the worst were:-

1. Fitness.
2. Lack of knowledge of the laws in general.
3. In particular - advantage, knock-ons, offside within the 10 yard circle.

Congratulations to all referees who controlled major games, especially the three appointed to the A.R.U. Panel. Congratulations also to the members who were sent on exchange to New Zealand, Sydney and wherever; reports from the Associations concerned were excellent.

Our relations with the Q.R.U. Appointment Board were Al. Many thanks to Phil Jones, John Forbes and senior referees for their assistance during the Season.

The 1984 Season has been one of mixed activity for the Society. The year was one in which there were few law changes for Senior Rugby and laws for U19 and Junior Rugby were implemented in a hurried fashion without assistance from this group.

The following were Highpoints:-

ANNUAL MEETING AND BI-ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

This was held in Melbourne in February and well attended by Members from Queensland. For the first time the Keynote Speaker came from outside Rugby. A senior umpire from the VFL gave us an insight into his code and how aspects relate to all forms of football adjudication. There were contributions from Messrs Jones, Waldron, Fitzgerald and Oxenford so the State was well represented. The annual meeting held no surprises.

NEXT BI-ANNUAL CONFERENCE

It was decided to hold this at the Gold Coast in early 1986. The Queensland bid was successful and will no doubt endeavour to match the excellent standard set by Victoria this year.

APPOINTMENTS BOARD SEMINAR

In May the seminar was held in Sydney and attended by Phil Jones, Murray Mcnae and myself from Queensland. A great deal was discussed however implementation has been slow. As I understand this will be a priority for 1985. In general there was little disagreement between states. A mode of uniformity is the thrust for the future. Communication between all parties also needs attention. The seminar was very successful.

REPRESENTATIVE APPOINTMENTS.

John Miner again was the Society's appointee and Queensland represented on the panel by Messrs Fitzgerald, Waldron, Oxenford. Appointments were well spread and it was pleasing to see and congratulations should go to Kerry Fitzgerald on his overseas appointments.


SEMINARS/WORKSHOPS/WORKBOOKS

The matter of training for referees needs to be addressed. Most States want seminars and instructional material. Some limited videotapes and the "Middleman" was used this year. Some material for a workbook was collected. However in the end there was a general apathy to the project. The incoming committee of the Society will need to consider the matter carefully. As a frustrated coaching director with insufficient time (although I thought I had it), co-operation from contributors and deadlines are essential.

This year saw the untimely death of John Chard a great supporter of the Society. He was destined to step into the role of the presidency. Kevin McGregor carried on and during his term great setps and co-operation between bodies has evolved. Ron Nicolle our longtime Secretary also deserves accolades.

Due to my absence from the mainstream of refereeing and the fact that fresh blood often brings a fresh approach I will not be standing for the executive next year.

I commend the Society and its work to you. A voice in Australian Rugby is needed for referees.

## AUSTRALIAN LAWS COMMITTEE

Due to the untimely passing of the Chairman, John Chard, the committee's function was disrupted to some degree. I would like to pay tribute to John for his unstinting devotion to Rugby and its administration. His work load on this committee was enormous and he handled the position with great efficiency. He will be greatly missed by Rugby Union.

The committee's main task was to review the Under 19 law variations. The committee has received recommendations from the A.R.F.U. Safety Committee and the A.R.F.U. Standards Committee and proposals have been submitted to the A.R.U. Until approved, details cannot be released.

The aim is to have unified Rugby laws for all. This will not be entirely possible due to special requirements of the Schools Rugby Union in the area of safety.

The areas where there will be probable changes are the Scrum, Ruck and Maul, and Foul Play.

The committee has also submitted to the A.R.U. as a proposed change to Law 22(3) (Proposed by the Q.R.U.) -

"when the ball in a maul becomes unplayable a scrummage shall be ordered and the team not in possession of the ball at the commencement of the maul shall put it in".

It is the committee's belief that this would simplify this law for all concerned.

## GRADES COMMITTEE REPORT 1984

For the Committee to be effective, its status must be upgraded. The Committee must be given a definite role and it must be given sufficient authority to function as an autonomous body. The Q.R.U. could give the Committee the sole responsibility to organise the grade competition, starting from the draw to the resolving of problem areas. If this was done the clubs may take the Committee seriously enough to appoint one of their senior executives as representative who could accurately speak for the club.

The liaison between the Committee and referees was excellent and few problems were experienced in this area.

JUDICIARY MEMBERS REPORT.

G.J. SHEEHAN

The 1984 Season was indeed a busy year for the Judiciary Committee. During the season, from the commencement of fixtures until the Semi-Finals, the committee met on 20 of the 22 weeks involved and heard reports on 39 players of the Senior Division.

Reports were as follows:

These figures when coupled with approximately 25 send off reports received in the Q.J.R.U. colt division is alarming. However, it does show that Referees are doing their task. The rest is up to the clubs. Only 2 of the 39 players reported had been dismissed from play before.

With the colt division now being amalgamated with the Q.R.U., I can see a very busy time for the next Judiciary committee. It may be time to expand the delegation representation to cope.

During the year there was an increasing number of attempts by players to introduce either T.V. playbacks or club video recordings of play to show their alleged innocence. Also several players attempted to produce as evidence written statements from opposing players and coaches along similar lines.

I suggest that the next committee shall have to address itself early to this problem and resolve the matter with the Q.R.U. and a definite policy be adopted.

I consider that video tapes are unfair if only those players on the main game are subject to T.V. Further at times it is not only that instant of play that induces the referee to take such positive action. The game has been played for 150 years and has relied on referees judgement. T.V. replays are mainly used by those who wish to question the referee, not praise them.



## EXAMINATION BOARD REPORT

Similar to 1983, this season was active in our aims to inject new blood into the association, not only to fill our immediate needs, but to encourage young referees especially from the schools, to participate in the game in the future.

Pre-season lectures were again conducted, followed by the sitting of the examination. Again a useful exercise with the association gaining 12 new referees. Good attendance also by G.T. schoolboys.

During the year, a steady stream of new referees completed exams highlighted by excellent work at B.B.C. by Kerry Fitzgerald. This culminated with many boys completing the examination. Hopefully this and similar exercises will be completed next year.

Special mention is also made of Chris Cohen and the great job undertaken by him in co-ordinating the masters and fathers at Nudgee Junior. Chris delivered a series of lectures which also culminated in an exam and field tests. This drive to improve the standard of school refereeing by Chris and Kerry can only be commended and hopefully will be expanded for obvious reasons.

Continuing work will be done to upgrade the examination paper to cover various law changes and moving trends in our game.

Thank you to those who assisted during the season and we look to every member's involvement in encouraging and coaching new referees in 1985.
