This is my thir d and final report to the Association, and as retiring President, I lhope that I am leaving the Association in as good as or better shape than it was when I was first elected. There are areas in which the Association has gained and lost over the last three years, and while it is sad toloosc the request for our members services in any area, I think the overall gains outweigh the losses. I will detail the losses first.

On order of merit or ranking, the loss of the annual interchange with the Eas, twood Club would be the major loss, one which appears to have occurred due to either apathy or antipathy on the part of our Sydney hosts., I have had no real feed back on the problem, however, our interchange with Parramatta is as strong as ever, and this year we sent Bob Kernouski and Danny Cummins there with gratifying results. I hope that this interchange grows and prospers in 1the future. Brisbane Boys College and Gregory Terrace did not request ousr member's services this year, B.B.C. having opted out in 1987. We still referee these schools in the C.I.C. competition withoutcomplaint. The loss of Terrace was a particular blow considering the number of courses we have held in the past for their pupils who wished to referee for the school. still appoint to Toowoomba and Ipswich Grammar Schools, and I hope that in the future the cycle with the other G.P.S. schools will reverse.

On the positive side our involvement with the T.A.S. schools has increased to the extent that they have requested our 1 sservices to their U/13 level in the next season. On behalf of the Association (and knowing I won't have to worry aboaut how it's done), I have accepted the additional tasks.

The Alecciation new nesses a large of referencing from U/10

and T.A.S. standard as well as club games to U/17 representative level. A large and varied menu indeed.

The Association is presently not incorporated, which is one of the things the present Committee wished to see completed but was unable to due to other pressures. However, with the case presently before the N.S.W. Courts of the player sueing the Referees Association, S.R.U. and Brian Kinsey, it would seem that Incorporation and/or indemnification of referees by players and their parents prior to the 1989 season are matters to be urgently attended to by the new committee. I congratulate all those who were selected for interchange and Grand Final honors. Their efforts on the field have been perceived and rewarded, and I trust that those who didn't make it this year will make it next year.

I would like to thank my Committee for their support, not only this lyear, but also in the past three years, without their support and the support of the members, the Association could lnot have continued. I was particularly pleased with the increase in membership this year.

It would be remiss of me to end without giving special thanks to Frank Meek for his fine efforts and supposrt as registrar, general dogsbody and inimitable fundraiser, CecMenzies for his guidance over a difficult period, and to George Houghton for his splendid efforts this year with lectures and examinations In parting I thank the Assoc. for placing its faith in me for the past three years, and I wish the Assoc, its members and all who sail with her, all the best for the future.

· She Dee Priordent With the season drawn to a close, it is time again for facts and figures. Most encouraging was that early in the season we attracted quite an influx of young referees who handled their games with competence. Mowever, not concouraging was the number of defections once the college season began. Mayertheless we are hoping for their return next year.

We also saw an increase in the number of referees from the previous season, a jump from 47 to 54, the first time in many years that this has happened.

The Association appointed to 952 fixtures throughout the season - an increase of 115 games, this came about mainly because of the split club rounds and the extra teams involved. We also saw the introduction of new laws, thankfully they were introduced prior to the commencement of the season making their implementation simpler, in general averyone seemed to be satisfied by the way they have been applied.

The big problem again this year would seem to be the abuse from the side line. I am sure that everyone would agree that the only real way to deal with this effectively is to completely ignore it; but that is easier said than done, abuse and fisel intimidated by it. Discussions with one or two senior members of local clubs about the problem verified the fact that spectators were not overly concerned about the odd Knock On or Forward Pass being missed, but that they were in fact very concerned when Little Johnnie was caught at the bottom of a ruck or trapped in a maul for any length of time - these two factors seemed to be the cause of most of the outbreak of abuse. Given these facts - people are very concerned and rightly so for the safety of rucking and mauling carry on for too long. Prior to the commencement of the 1989 season, lectures on the laws and safety factors will have to be locked at long and hard.
