



ROOMS COMMITTEE REPORT

I have pleasure in providing the trading statement for the Referees room for this past year. As can be seen from the figures our actual profits from trading were substantially down on the previous year. However I consider the season was still very successful. Basic reasons for the decline in profits were:-

- (1) The abnormally high turnover during World Cup Year
- (2) A notable decline in visitors to the Room after Big Matches this year.
- (3) Provision of drinks in the Referees' Change Room all year
- (4) Hosting of a number of "free drinks and eats" meetings during the year.

As can be further seen from the figures, a large amount of the previous year's trading profits has been injected back into improvements to the Room during this current year. These include a video recorder; a refrigerator for the Changing Room and overhead fans in the Room. We were further pleased to donate \$500.00 towards both the Senior and Junior Association end of season functions.

The Room functioned effectively and efficiently on Meeting Nights and Big Match days, though generally staffed by a handful of stalwarts, and as usual I express my sincere gratitude to Tim Harland representing the Senior Association for his invaluable assistance.

Q.J.R.R.A. REGISTRARS REPORT - THE FACTS

Throughout the 1989 season, the Association appointed to 1099 games. This represents an increase of 137 games on the 1988 season and an increase of 252 games on the 1987 season. We again saw an influx of new referees during the season, however the overall number of "active" referees decreased from 54 to 53.

When you consider that the Association appoints to an average of 64 games a weekend, several members were appointed to 4 or even 5 games a weekend. To all those members who usually at very short notice refereed the additional game or two, my special thanks. One member who shall remain nameless but with the initials R.M.) one Saturday travelled to The Southport School in the morning to referee 2 games and on his way home to Brisbane detoured via Ipswich Grammar School to referee another game. That is what I call dedication. To all those members who travelled far and wide during the season, thank you.

Once again, the perennial problem of abuse directed at the referee continued with disastrous effects. One of our junior members was forced to "hang up his whistle" due to continuing harassment from the sideline. No member should be subject to such abuse. Players must be made aware to accept the referees decision, be it right or wrong. Overall, many favourable reports were received by the Association from various clubs and colleges.

TARANAKI INTERCHANGE 14 - 21 JULY 1989

The Pilot of the Fokker Friendship bade us Welcome to Taranaki, New Zealand as the plane landed at New Plymouth airport. What a welcome, Cold, Wet and Windy. There to meet us was Clive Wheeler, my billett for the next three days. On the drive from New Plymouth to Stratford, Clive's home town about 60km inland and some 1500 feet above sea level, we were advised that this weather was normal and would not prevent us blowing the whistle on the playing field the next day.

After a quiet uneventful night, Saturday morning loomed gloomy, wet and windy. Mt Egmont standing glorious approximately 5km away with its dazzling snow capped peak certainly did not help to motivate me to venture outside into 5 degree temperature and pouring rain when informed that I was to referee a under 21 game at Eltham, about 10km away, at 11am. Arriving at the ground, I found both teams, Bell Block and Eltham, very eager to play in the conditions, a field completely waterlogged - certain to be a quagmire of red mud after 80 minutes of football. Surprisingly, the game was of a very good standard and apart from being covered in mud from head to foot at the end of the game, the players and coaches were very happy with the match. The invitation back to their Clubrooms for a hot supper and cold beer displayed their enthusiasm for the social aspect of the game. The eventful nights begun that night and on Sunday I journeyed to Rugby Park in New Plymouth for my next game, a Taranaki under 16 trial. To trudge through 6 to 12 inches of mud for 70 minutes was an exceptional achievement, not only for myself but the players as well, especially when the mud was only content when relieving one of ones boots at every step. The conditions were atrocious to say the least but to experience such is quite memorable.

Monday presented a bright picture with the sun shining and the availability to do some sightseeing of this picturesque countryside. A brief interlude was to referee a Shield final at the Cardiff Primary School, a very enjoyable duty as the ground was dry and firm, before venturing to the local RSL to socialize with more of the local identities. I moved to my next billett, Gary Urbahn who lives at Hawera, on Tuesday and most of the day was spent touring around the district. That night, the local Referee Association had a "POT LUCK TEA" at Gary's place that was a very enjoyable social evening lasting well into the morning. To my surprise and delight, a 1st Fifteen match on Wednesday that I had been appointed to between Hawera High and Stratford High was cancelled due to the ground being to wet to play on. Hard to believe but it happened. Thankfully, I was glad it was called off as the temperature was about 3 degrees and the wind was coming straight off Mt Egmont. No Rugby, great, off to the Hawera races we went for an afternoon in the Members. No such luck, too wet to run and the races were abandoned after the second race. No problem says Gary, off to "The Furlong Hotel" for the afternoon to dicuss the form of the local fillies. At least we didn't lose any money there.

Good news on arriving home, a 1st Fifteen match at Waitra between Waitra High and visiting Otrohanga High on Thursday morning at 10am. The fine sunny day and firm fast track put a smile on one's face but the 0 degree ground and 3 degree air temperature certainly "Blue" the Qld suntan. An excellent game of rugby equivalent to the GPS standard here in Brisbane. Back to the Primary School on Friday at Stratford to referee two games, u/10 and u/12, in the District School Competition. The weather, although sunny, had not improved on the temperature scale from Thursday and I really felt sorry for the boys running around in bare feet. Even the locals were admitting it was DAMM COLD.

I moved in with my final billett, Graham Harris in Inglewood, on Friday afternoon. Finals time in the District competition and an appointment to an under 17 major semi at Bell Block on Saturday between the Top North and Top South Taranaki teams. The game was a very enjoyable one to referee with the final score being 6 - 4 to the North team. After taking in a Senior Rugby Match that afternoon, it was off to the Official Referees Dinner that Night. A thoroughy enjoyable evening with both Ross and I receiving a Presentation of a Taranaki Referee Association Tie and having the opportunity to personally thank out hosts for a wonderful time.

Our last day in Taranaki shone brillant which allowed final sightseeing of Mt Egmont, the first time one could actually get up to the snowline some 3,000 ft above sea level, and the final game of our visit. I was appointed to the Final under 21 Trial between the North and South Taranaki Teams which was played at the Bell Block grounds. This would of been the best game I controlled during the week and the one that I enjoyed the most. I put this down to the fact that it was a final trial and the players skill level was of a high standard. The Club hospitality was once again to the fore, even on trials day, when Bell Block invited us to join the players for supper and enjoy some cold refreshments.

To be selected to go on the Interchange was an honour for myself. I would like to thank the Association and the Queensland Junior Rugby Union for the opportunity to have met new friends and gained a broader experience in refereeing.

AUSTRALIAN UNDER 16 CHAMPIONSHIP - DARWIN July 1-8, 1989

We finally arrived in Darwin on Sunday 2 July - some 22 hours late due to a "minor technical fault" with our aircraft. Waiting around Brisbane airport all day, being told at regular intervals that the flight would be departing in two hours, is not the most enjoyable way to spend a Saturday, particularly if, as was the case with the Tasmanian team who travelled with us, you had been travelling since 6.00am the same morning.

After a 6.30am take-off on Sunday morning and two attempts at landing in Darwin, we were met by our billet, John Hall, and promptly introduced to the hospitality that was to be prevalent throughout the whole week.

The delayed arrival of both Queensland and the Tasmanian teams caused a number of games to be rescheduled. It is a credit to the organisation of the NTJRU and particularly the tournament organiser, Roger Rudduck that the rescheduled games were played without any evident disruption to the programme.

Because of the temperature during the day - the locals complained of being cold one day when the maximum was 27° - all games were played in the evening. First game kick-off was 5.00pm with the final game at 8.00pm.

With the games being played in the evening, Bob and I had all day free. We used the time to see as much of Darwin as possible.

On the Wednesday, we were the guests of the Western Australian team on a visit to the Crocodile Farm some 40kms out of Darwin, followed by a barbeque lunch at a delightful natural billabong called "Berry Springs". We were assured the billabong was "croc free". Needless to say, we waited until the boys had tested the water before taking the plunge.

On Thursday Bob and I took a coach trip to Kakadu National Park. The six hours on the bus were well worth while to gain an all but superficial insight into the natural beauty of the region.

Friday evening was occupied by the Presentation Dinner, held at the Hotel Darwin. It was a thoroughly enjoyable evening capped off by an extremely witty after dinner speech by the recently retired Administrator of the Northern Territory, Commodore Eric Johnstone, who, we were to discover, was the step-father of John Hall, our billet for the week.

The disappointing aspect of the tournament was the method of allocation of referees to games. Apart from Bob and myself, the only other visiting referee was Paul Ballantyne from Western Australia. In spite of only having three visiting referees, I was allocated two games and Bob three games, during the entire tournament, all of which were between division two teams. These appointments could be understandable if the standard of refereeing was high. Unfortunately, in a significant number of games, the standard of refereeing was not consistent with the quality of football being played. The appointment of referees reached a farcial climax when, on the finals day, a NT referee was appointed to the game between NT and SA whilst one of the visiting referees was rewarded with running touch for two games.
