PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This year saw the continued growth of our Association in both numbers and our role in Qld Rugby.

We also welcomed a new major sponsor in Ansett Air Freight and hope for the continued support in years to come.

This year we consolidated our commitment to the GPS Schools by being invited back to officiate at all of their 'A' games plus Touch Judges for the 1st XV.

We were invited by the TAS Assoc. this year to appoint to both Red & Blue Divisions 1st, 2nd & 15A Games plus Touch Judges for 1st XV. I believe that this has been a great success and in spite of the large commitment needed the enthusiastic support of members made this expanded role possible and I know that having more games available will encourage more referees to join our ranks.

The presence of consistent independent top level referees in all grades of school football can only improve the standard and strength of the game.

Five Qld referees were appointed to the Australian Panel again this year with Andrew Cole being selected to join Kerry, Barry, Bernie and Mark after the retirement from representative rugby of Col Waldron. All these members received Australian appointments this season with the highlights being Kerry's first home Test, Aust. v. USA to follow his Canada, USA, Argentina appointments earlier and Barry Leask's first Test Appointment Japan v. USA. Congratulations Barry!

Although we have seen the demise of the South Pacific Championship I am sure that our members will continue to receive appointments to top level games.

At the start of the season we were invited to send a panel of referees to the ASRR Advanced Refereeing Seminar in Sydney and as well as our members we sponsored Kevin O'Halloran from Mackay to help in the development of county refereeing. Once again this year we had all Qld County Assoc. Offiliate with us and we continue to promote their development and this in turn will help build this into a truly Qld Assoc. I urge the incoming committee to continue in this role.

This year the Aust. Institute of Sport through the ARU set up a panel of referees for development and two of our members (Andrew Cole and Scott Young) were chosen to be part of this initial panel. We would hope that this scheme can be further expanded in future years and wish Dick Byres well in this endeavour.

This year each referee was equipped with a complete range of uniforms at no personal cost and our new look has certainly been well received by both members and the public. Once again we issued these at no cost to all affiliated County Referees who were appointed to games by the Qld Representative Appointments Board.

We undertook an expanded Interchange programme and congratulations to the following members who were chosen to represent our Association.

Tony Mellick & Peter Weingott to Kiama; Neil Smith & Mike Gahan to Sydney; Mick Eastwood to ACT; David True & Geoff Gardner to North Harbour (new); Scott Young & Mike Carmody to Canterbury; Geoff Pegg to Hamilton.

Most of the visiting interchange referees were hosted to co-incide with the 2nd Test Aust. v. France and the mid season social. This also gave us the opportunity to renew our acquaintance with the Test referee Clive Norling. We also hosted the USA interchange referee Mark Binning. I would like to thank those members and their families who assisted with billets and the hosting of our visitors.

With the big increase in the number of appointments this season we set our Appointments Officer up with an answering service and this has proven to be a major success. It was also heartening to see the support of the majority of members in keeping changes to a minimum.

A special word of thanks must go to the Chairman of Classification and appointments, lan Scotney for his untiring efforts over the last two seasons and I certainly have appreciated his support. My thanks also to Peter Galloway and Paul Dempsey for their efforts during this time.

With the continuing growth of our Assoc. it has been pleasing to note the high standards of our new members and for this I thank Andrew Cole for his efforts in training and examinations. Andrew also provided the bulk of our meeting night lectures as well as accepting the role of our senior Lawman.

The social calendar this year started with our Golf Day/Dinner which once again was a raging success in spite of the weather and I thank Scott Young and his sub-committee for their efforts in organising the event. Thanks also to Peter Meares and Pat Welsh for their contribution as guest speakers. This is now an established part of the Rugby calendar as well as our major fundraising venture and I am sure that the Assoc. will continue with this event in years to come. I wish to very heartily thank all of our sponsors of this event as it played a major part in us becoming a financially independent association.

Our end of year dinner was held at Ballymore with a return to the previous format of the announcement of Grand Final Referee. The dinner was very well attended and a great social occasion with Jake Howard proving to be an interesting and entertaining guest speaker.

Congratulations to those referees and touch judges who were appointed to Grand Finals. Major Trophy recipents this year were Andrew Cole as Most Valuable Member and Mike Carmody receiving the Murray McNae Award as the Most Inproved Referee.

The Referees Room functioned very well this season and several very enjoyable Pizza and Beer nights took place.

I wish to thank Richard Bendeich and Mike Carmody for their efforts in making the room an enjoyable meeting spot with the benefits of the room now coming back to those who use it.

I have received very many reports from all sources that the standard of refereeing in this Assoc. has never been higher and with the influx of new members plus our wider commitments I am positive that this standard will be maintained.

I stress on all those referees who aspire to higher honours that you must be prepared to put more back into the game than you want from it, if you wish to succeed.

I wish to thank all the members of my executive, Ted Apted, David True, Joe Carter, Scott Young, Tony Mellick, Kim Buchanan and Mark Powell for their support over the past two years.

I have enjoyed very much my two years as your President and I thank you for giving me this opportunity to put into place those initiatives which I believe have made this a stronger and better association.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The association recorded a loss of \$13,289.81 (\$18,467.97 Profit — 1989) from a turnover of \$27,336.80 (\$33,758.50 — 1989).

The loss was due to the committee's decision to outfit the association at a cost of \$16,006 and for the first time we had to pay for our own interchanges at a cost of \$7,333.

Our most successful Golf Day netted us \$10,352 as this function increases in importance to the fund raising of the association.

Financial membership is increased by 5 over 1989 as demonstrated below:-

1985 — 62 Members 1986 — 77 Members 1987 — 86 Members 1988 — 80 Members 1989 — 85 Members 1990 — 90 Members

With the increasing demand being placed on the association by the members to provide ongoing benefits it is important we maintain our fund raising activities and look towards other avenues to support us.

It is beneficial to all concerned we no longer rely on the QRU for financial support however this independence comes at a price.

I am sure your committee would welcome any suggestions from our membership regarding fund raising and membership benefits.

AUSTRALIAN SOCIETY 1990

FINANCE

1990 saw a rationalisation of our activities enforced by financial constraints. Our sponsorship has now lapsed and we have been unable to negotiate any further agreements. The ARU regards the Australian Panel referees as being part of the ARU sponsorship package and therefore we can't use the panel for promotion. We therefore have very little to offer a sponsor.

We are now totally reliant on the ARU and member associations for funding.

Our future programmes and activities will be tailored to the finance available. Members will be asked to bear a more realistic portion of the running costs.

EXCHANGES

Official ASRR exchanges will be curtailed. The ARU does not support exchanges at a National level. The executive attempted to negotiate an exchange with New Zealand at a first class level (ie) swap NSW Vs Queensland for Auckland Vs Canterbury. We see much merit in this form of exchange, however, the ARU has other ideas, mostly related to the hip pocket, I feel.

Phil Thomas will be going to France as a one off exchange funded by the Sydney Referees Association and endorsed by the Society. This may be the method of continuing exchanges if states can finance them.

We continue to recognise the need to provide opportunities for referees from associations other than NSW and Queensland and therefore will continue to sponsor promising referees to be seen at a higher level.

REFEREE DEVELOPMENT

This is a critical area of concern and therefore the Society held the Advanced Referees Seminar in Sydney

this year. The weekend was a great success and we have quite a number of potentially excellent referees.

However, there does seem to be a problem in the progress of these promising referees from this level. At the moment our test referees are nearing the end of their careers. There appears to be some failing in the system in preparing future test referees. The top three received all appointments this year — even to minor internationals. I feel we have missed an ideal opportunity to introduce new blood. This must be addressed.

COACHING

It is also recognised that we must ensure that a high standard of refereeing is maintained at a grass roots level. The coaching director is developing a plan for the next few years. It will probably be locally resourced because of the financial situation. However, we regard this as a top priority for activity in 1991.

1992 CONVENTION

The convention will be held in the Hunter Valley on February 21 & 22. This will be an event not to be missed both for its refereeing and social highlights. I'm sure we are all looking forward to the Queensland contingents' bus trip.

ASSR REFEREES BADGE & BLAZER BADGE

Once again, a vote of thanks to all participants. We look forward to their continued support in 1991.







AFRU Appointments

All referees officiated at matches under the control of the ARFU and acquitted themselves well.

QRU Appointments

These meetings were held and both City and Country referees were appointed to a wide range of games.

Country Referee Development

Where asked we have provided games in our local competition to assist. Thanks to the many members who assisted with transport, billeting etc.

Interchanges

Another growth industry which needs to be watched carefully. Timing is important. During our busiest part of the season we had 5 referees away.

Interchanges however are essential for development and we now have a very solid program which caters for all levels of referees.

Grand Final Appointments

Same policy as in 1989 operated again, I believe very successfully. Congratulations to all participants particularly Michael Yates who had a spectacular night at the Wests 5th Grade Grand Final.

First Grade Panel

Two new appointees. Well done to David True and Peter Bechtel.

Promotion and Relegation

A thorny issue. The latest Grading Sheet will show you that there has been considerable movement in the 28 Grade referees. Until we have a fully independent regular group of watchers, a fair promotion and relegation system on a week to week basis cannot be implemented.

Performance Standards

Still somewhat erratic. A contributing factor to this I believe is the number of games we are asked to do. Some referees may do up to 4/5 games in some weeks. It is difficult to maintain an even standard under those conditions.

Lower Graded/New Referees

This has been our area of greatest improvement. We now have a solid group of referees in 4th Grade challenging for positions in the higher grades. Recruiting this year has seen some real success and I believe our efforts to ease them into the mainstream of refereeing on a gradual basis has borne fruit.

Similar effort next year will see some real results.

Assessors/Coaches/Watchers

Simply we do not have enough. My thanks to Don Duffell and Phil Jones who helped us out so willingly during the year.

The situation needs to be addressed.

Appointments should be separated from classifications and strength built up in the "watching" area as "one on one" attention is better than a written report any day.

General

You may consider this report to be somewhat negative. It is not meant to be so. Success and growth bring ills which need addressing.,

- Pull outs some weekends over 20 changes.

Computerisation would help and firm operating guidelines/policy should be implemented and adhered to. We can't help all the people all the time.

Having said that, it has been an enjoyable/challenging year.

Thanks to Gabrielle and the QRU Office Staff who were always co-operative and helpful.

Many thanks also to "Demps". I doubt that anyone else in the Association would do such a thankless job so well. He has a band of members he knows will support him. Well done to them also.

1991 will continue the growth. The Committee will need you all.

JAPAN V USA TEST MATCH — TOKYO 23 SEPTEMBER 1990

On arrival in Japan, I refereed U.S.A. v Japan B in Sapporo on the northern island of Hokkaido. The match was a free flowing affair, with some great opportunities to play advantage to its fullest. The final score being U.S.A. 53 and Japan B 34.

Japan U/23 won the next match of the Eagles Tour in Nagoya, which I didn't participate in, by 16-0. This match was played during a typhoon, which ended up with a death toll of 39. Luckily none of these were in the vicinity of this rugby field.

The third and final match was the Test Match at the National Rugby Stadium in Tokyo in front of approximately 25,000 fans. The Stadium was only

completed in 1989 but it was in perfect condition for the 3.15 p.m. kick-off. The game was a hard fought affair and played in good spirit; some good ball movement; the Eagles dominating the lineouts and finally proving superior in the scrummage. The Eagles won 25-15 with 2 converted tries in the last 5 minutes of the game.

Throughout my time in Japan, I was very well looked after by the Japan Rugby Union and the referees nominated by them as liaison officers.

Skill levels were very hard to determine given the weather, however, I felt that while the mauling and general forward play was good, the set plays particularly scrums were not of a high standard which was surprising, back play was obviously quite limited on the day. Two assessors from North Harbour Rugby Referees association were in attendance both at the game and apré game, showing considerable ability at not mentioning anything about my game and at drinking and buying beer for the visiting referee.

COUNTRY REFEREES DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

This ad hoc committee was formed by Kevin Crowe just over three years ago to plan and oversee a developmental programme for Country referees spanning an estimated five years.

Current members are: R. Bourke (Director, North); R. Brown (Director, Central); K. Crowe (Director, South and Development Officer, Queensland Country Referees) (Administrator); D. Duffell (Brisbane); P.A. Jones (Brisbane) (Chairman); W. Muller (Townsville); C. Oxenford (Gold Coast); R. White (Rockhampton); J. Blaikie (Toowoomba) and H. Innes (Gold Coast), both invited to join 1991.

The Committee's principal role has been to facilitate the Five Year Plan, to assist in the coaching and assessment of Country referees and to guide the Q.R.U. Appointments Board in appointing referees to representative games in the Country Districts including Winfield State games, XXXX Competition games and MIM Colts Competition games.

To this end we have been able to nominate the top five referees in each District and to grade the top six State wide. With the prime Country appointment — Queensland Country v NSW Country — going to the top Country referee there is now a clear ladder of progress for Country referees to climb.

Kevin O'Halloran, from Mackay, joined referees from Brisbane to attend the Senior Referees Seminar early in the year.

In March a very successful seminar on the Assessment of Referees was held in Brisbane. A manual has been produced and is in the process of being distributed. As a result there should now be greater consistency among Country Districts assessments.

The theme for 1991 will be Recruitment and Training.
