NEW ZEALAND TRIP REFEREE'S REPORT

John Dee and I departed Brisbane on time for a cold and rainy Auckland and stayed at the Travel Lodge which turned out to be a very comfortable hotel. We left for New Plymouth the following morning and I was met by Frank Snowdon who I stayed with for the next three days. That first Saturday, the 14th of July, I had two games, the first being a schoolboys match. They were about 14 years old. The second match in the afternoon was between the top Under 19s and the potential wooden spooners. That game ended up 66-4, but it was still enjoyable because of the change to International law. After the game Frank and his wife took me to a dinner which was put on by the Taranaki referees. On the 15th I left Frank's home and went to Hawera for a social game between two Brothers Schools. There I met up with Brian Crawford and his wife Jocelyn. Brian had just bought himself a dairy farm and it was great to get out of town to experience some other parts of New Zealand. His farm is just outside Rahotu. At the time when I was staying with Brian he was in the middle of studying to become a New Zealand appointed referee. I was fortunate to be present at one of the meetings in which they discussed International Law. On the 20th Gary Urban, who was in Brisbane earlier put on a BBQ dinner at his home in Hawera. After leaving Brian and his wife's home I went and stayed with Clive Wheeler. Clive organised a game at a Primary School in which I met Taranaki's newest and highest ranked referee along with one of New Zealands greatest halfbacks of the 1980s or so they say. In the lead up to my final game there was a lot of talk of high pressure because the two teams in the semi-final met the week before and the game ended in a nil all draw. The way it worked out the Under 19s game was the best game I have been able to referee. It was tough and the two teams took the rules to the limit and they played it at that high standard throughout the game. In closing I would like to extend my thanks to Frank Snowdon, Brian Crawford and Clive Wheeler and their families for having me and being so kind to me. Last but by no means least all my thanks to those in our own Referees' Association for giving me the opportunity to go and experience New Zealand and their football first hand. It was an experience I will have for the rest of my life.

My first game was an U/21 match between Stratford and Inglewood, at which Graham Harris, who was over in 1988, kindly ran touch. The match was transferred to the Inglewood High School where GRaham used to be caretaker because of wet grounds - and the delay in starting deprived me of my favourite pasttime, running touch for the first grade - oh dear!

An U16's schoolboy trial at Stratford High followed on Sunday, and a transfer to Waitera on Monday to Trevor and Rene Sharman. U/13 representative trials on Monday afternoon were followed on Tuesday bya 2nd XV & 1st XV at Devon Intermediate. On Wednesday I was on the move again back to Stratford H.S. for coaching match between the High Schools 1st XV and an representative players team similar to the coaching squad that goes around GPS & TAS schools in Brisbane.

Gary Urbahn picked me up and took me to Harcrawa to introduce me to his home brew.

Thursday included a trip into the back country to referee two spirited barefoot games.
