PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This year will be remembered as the year of change. Over the past 12 months the QRRA has been negotiating with the country associations and the QJRRA to merge into one statewide association. This concept was popularly known as "One State".

I am delighted to say that by the end of this year "One State" will be a reality. To my counterparts in the country, my congratulations on the way discussions and negotiations (to achieve this) were conducted.

To the QJRRA, on this public record I assure you there is no "Hidden Agenda" and the door will always be left open.

Appointment on performance became the policy for 1993. I have no doubt that this policy was directly responsible for consistently higher performance levels throughout all referees but notably amongst referees competing for A Grade games.

If you refer to the appointments report I am sure you will notice a greater cross section of games refereed by members. This is contributing greatly to their development.

The QRU and Terry Doyle are to be commended on their foresight in appointing David True as the director of coaching referees. This appointment has given us the opportunity to consolidate Queensland as the leading state in Australia for the recruitment and development of referees. We must grab this opportunity.

To me the one disappointment this year was in coaching. The retirement of a number of long serving members has left us very thin in the coaching area.

1994 must be the year of coach. I can only recommend to the incoming committee to follow the plans laid down in this vital area.

In closing I would like to offer my congratulations to all referees on their performance this year. From the member who did his first game to Barry Leask who controlled the Australia Tonga Test.

To the executive and sub-committee - a year well done.

In 1994 the QRRA will represent all referees and I am certain that we will achieve our goals for 1994.

REPORT FROM THE COMMITTEE

During the 1993 Season the QRRA appointed Referees to 1,960 games in the Brisbane Senior and Colts Competitions, GPS and TAS Schools, Sub-districts and other miscellaneous matches. Referees for those games were drawn from a pool of approximately 120 active and semi-active members of the association.

In general, the association met it's obligation to supply referees as required, although on weekends when all games were played on only one day, many referees were required to handle more than one game on the day.

Thirty one new referees joined the association as active members during the year. Through the office of the newly appointed Coaching Director-Referees, a further 100 plus referees were recruited and qualified to act with the schools competitions in those grades not appointed to by a Referee's Association. It is envisaged that this program of recruitment and training will continue and become the nursery and principal breeding ground for senior referees in the future.

Aided by financial assistance from TNT Air Couriers, the QRRA was able to take a wider role in refereeing affairs throughout Queensland. Association President, Tony Mellick attended a refereeing weekend in Townsville where he was extremely well received. The association funded the Pre-season training camp at Moogerah Dam, which was attended by many country based referees.

The QRRA wishes to acknowledge the generous support of TNT Air Couriers as the Association's major sponsor. We are also grateful for the free use of St. Laurence's College, Moogerah Dam camp site and the contribution of their staff as cooks, trainers etc.

During 1993, Queensland Referees received 11 appointments (of 26) made by the Australian Rugby Union to major representative games. The highlight of these was the appointment of Barry Leask to control the Australia/Tonga Test Match at Ballymore. Also of significance was the appointment of Scott Young to control his first full Queensland game (Qld. v ACT) and the Australia vs New Zealand U19 International.

The Association continued with its international and Interstate interchange program by sending five referees to New Zealand and one to Sydney. We were pleased to host in return six New Zealand referees, one from Western Samoa, one from Canada, one each from Victoria and ACT and two from Sydney, all on an official basis. Other visiting referees were also welcomed and provided with games wherever possible.

1994 looms as an exciting year of challenge and development for referees. The new State Wide Association, an increased demand through the expanded suburban Competition, an influx of new referees to be developed and trained and commitment to raising the levels of consistency and competence across the State will be addressed with a new enthusiasm and vigour.

APPOINTMENTS/CLASSIFICATION REPORT

A bold new experiment was undertaken this season with the abolition of gradings for referees.

The reasons for this move were:

- (a) To give the appointments system the freedom to appoint referees to games according to their current form, as reported.
- (b) To create equal opportunity (for all) to referee the better standard games.

I believe the system was successful and it enabled most referees to be appointed to a wider range of games thus adding to their experience. It certainly created the opportunity for improvement.

The reporting feed-back on referees came from three sources:

- (i) The Classification Group. This group was very small in numbers being reduced early in the season by resignations but managed to compile 128 referee reports during the season. Most significant referee movements came from this source.
- (ii) The Mentor System. This started well but through the year did not provide anywhere near enough feed-back to appointments, and the time delays were too long. Hopefully the recent coaching course will provide more emphasis and structure to this system.
- (iii) Clubs. Some Presidents, Managers, Coaches provided feed-back on referees performances but this system needs to be more formalised to filter out the impact of club results. I would like to see someone charged with the responsibility of getting the club reporting system working in the new season.

The improvement selection criteria for all referees was based on the following.

- Suitability/Availability. All appointments were made from the regular availability sheets which also
 gave some options to referees on the type of game they prefer to control. Those referees who have a
 cronic problem of selective availability were not considered for promotion. To get ahead you need to be
 available for appointment to any type or grade of game anywhere in the geographic spread of the
 association.
- Fitness. Referees are expected to have a level of physical fitness and mobility relative to the standard of the game they are handling. If you do not try to improve your fitness and mobility then you cannot expect to be appointed to higher grades. Generally the standard was good.
- Attitude and Handling of the Game. Referees were encouraged not to dominate the game and to develop preventative refereeing techniques.
- Willingness to Learn. Those who listened and were willing to alter/modify their game as a result of constructive advice, achieved better results.
- Ability. At the end of the day some referees are better than others.

The above criteria were also used for the selection of the final panel for the Murray McNee Award (Most Improved Referee).

This panel was:

Greg Hinton Michael Jennings Russel Milne Terry O'Connor Geoff Pegg John Raukette

with Russel Milne being the recipient of the award.

The number of appointments was high compared to our numbers, and we were particularly stretched during the GPS and TAS school season with last minute non-availability becoming a major problem again. I believe we need at best another thirty referees to cover our mid-season commitments. Coupled with this some schools expressed concerns about old boys being appointed as referees, particularly to the age group 'A' games. This issue has serious implications and all referees must determine their priorities regarding availability for school games

Once again the schools competitions provided much excellent rugby with most schools being very competitive at all levels and their spectator support giving a lot of referees their biggest exposure to crowds.

For the second year now, finals referees were selected in groups of three for each grade of game, with each referee controlling a semi-final or preliminary final. The grand-final referees were then selected from each group. Congratulations to all referees who made this finals selections.

I want to thank the untiring helpers, Paul and Richard, who gave up their spare time, and a lot of sleep, to handle all of the changes which happened throughout the season. Thanks also to those members who continually co-operated with them.

Finally I wish to thank the Association for giving me the opportunity to put this new system of appointment into operation and I know that many referees have received, and will in the future receive more reward for effort.

Due to the interchange corresponding with New Zealand school holidays games were unfortunately in short supply. Games allocated for the first weekend were played at Glenfield in cold, wet and generally unpleasant conditions. Michael refereed an Under 21 game played using Under 19 laws and Greg a Senior B game. ASRR REPORT 1993

With the appointment of the position of National Referee Development Officer, and consequently State Coaching Officers, referee training and coaching is no longer the role of the ASRR.

This has been a momentous step in referee training and development and the benefits are immediate as is evidenced by the work of Russell Trotter (National), David True (Qld), Justin Dwyer (NSW) and the other states part-time directors.

However, this has changed the role of the ASRR and much time was spent in developing a Mission Statement and Objectives of the ASRR. From this, it is clear that the major roles of the ASRR are -1. Liaison and relations with ARU, and 2. Ceremonial.

It is therefore evident that our current structure of administration is cumbersome and not cost effective. A recommendation will be made to the 1994 AGM that the Executive be reduced to 3 members (President, Secretary/Treasurer and one other). The AGM will become the policy forum for the Society with the executive implementing the state policies during the year by telephone link up.

The 1994 Convention and AGM will be held in Perth as you all know and I encourage you all to attend. A great program has been arranged.

The Society has an excellent relationship with the ARU and we continue to push for further development and recognition of the referee's place in Australian Rugby.

Preliminary plans are progressing to form a Southern Hemisphere Referees Forum. We are currently having discussions with the NZ referees.

Although this result seems pretty good, it may not satisfy many of the opportunities and visions which we have. In addition, we are not generating the income we once were. This may be linked to the fact that, as an association, we have no clear and specific goals in mind for the rooms.

As the initiator and founding chairman of the clubrooms, I feel that within a short time frame, we have to decide the future directions of this facility.

Initially, the rooms were to provide the vital fundraising function of the Association.

- * Provide out of pocket expenses and member subsidies
- * Sponsor various Association presentations to both members and visitors
- * Make donations to exchange referees to ably represent the Association
- * Sponsor member functions and social occasions

- * Upgrade and purchase assets for room and its refurbishment
- * Provide special projects for the benefit of all referees

I feel that it is important to maximise the potential of these rooms and that every referee should benefit.

Our next step is to set up an active rooms program which will see any number of strategies to achieve funding projects such as:

APPOINTMENTS COMMITTEE

To our many new members, welcome to our Association. This year we championed an active policy by using the late 'non-availability' of referees to provide an incentive for individual development and an opportunity for promotion.

Many referees helped at very short notice indeed, and I hope that you enjoyed these 'extra' games. In what at first seems like an impossible task each week, many thanks for providing 'light at the end of the tunnel'.

1993 saw what is arguably the longest 'competitive season' which our Association has refereed. It began with a flurry of trial matches in February and ended with the Australian University games in October. In that time we only experienced three weekends when it rained. There will be many referees who did not referee in the wet this year. A total of 2,180 games were appointed for this year - approximately 1960 'recorded' games and 120 'ancillary' games.

We accepted the responsibility of refereeing ten competitions; namely —

A Grade Club Colts Club U/21 Club Subdistricts GPS Schools
TAS Schools Metway Schools Inter Colleges QRU Representative Secondary Schools

These competitions overlapped into a 23 week season. We had an average of 85 games a week and experienced an average of 16 changes to each weekends appointment sheet. (Not including touchjudge changes / alterations).

This represents alterations of almost 20% to the published list. With an average of at least three telephone calls to 'replace' a referee, you can imagine what nightmares occurred on Thursday and Fridays.

If I have rung anyone at an inconvenient time, please remember, I am only the intermediary, with only so many hours 'spare time' in the day. It is certainly not unusual for me to receive notice at 10.30pm at night or 2 hours before a game. A special thanks to those referees who helped out in those instances.

This generosity was especially evident in the co-ordinating of over 20 special events. These included:
