President's Report 2004

As in past seasons, season 2004 saw the Association deal with change and new challenges. The Brisbane rugby competition again underwent significant change with the QRU's commitment to Premier Rugby in three grades, the remainder of senior rugby encompassed within the Community Rugby program, and the increased growth of junior rugby. Associated with this was the continued, extensive use of senior referees and referee coaches of the Association, in tasks and appointments for the ARU. Consequently, during season 2004, serious strain was placed on the Association's resources. Despite these challenges, the members continued to provide a high quality service in match officiation for the competitions and tournaments to which we were invited to appoint.

One significant challenge the Association had to meet during 2004, was the change in culture for clubs, schools, and other rugby groups, to remunerate referees for their services. Historically, the QRU, published policy and guidelines for the remuneration of match officials. The Management Committee, and in particular Mark Logan, were instrumental in formulating these guidelines and policy. Cultural change is not easy, and many within the rugby community are resisting this cultural shift. With the support of the QRU and the strength of conviction of all the members of the Association, this is a problem that can be overcome.

Another challenge that the Association faced during 2004, was the protection of our members from verbal and physical abuse from spectators and team officials during and post match. Several serious breaches of the ARU code of conduct occurred at different fixtures. There was media attention with a few of these incidents, which in some cases were not reported accurately. These breaches of the code of conduct are serious matters, which the Association and the QRU take seriously.

The Association has been working with both the QRU and different competition committees on improving this aspect of Brisbane rugby. It's something that will have to be closely monitored in 2005. The QRU and the Association, through the different competition committees and organisers, are working towards all sections of the rugby community having greater empathy for match officials. The referee is no longer "fair game".

Season 2004 saw about 3000 games refereed, by about 175 referees, with 20 referee coaches watching and reporting. Of these 175 referees, an average of over 30 regularly attends Clarie's training. This year we recruited 29 new referees. Rodd Brockett reached the significant milestone of 100 first grade matches, while Mick Abell is within a few matches of having refereed 1000 games for the Association.

Attendances at meeting nights, referee coaches meetings and pre-season camp have been good, meaning that many referees are have availed themselves of the opportunity to improve their refereeing. It is pleasing to see the progression and development of some of our younger and newer referees. It is however, with disappointment, that I acknowledge the retirement of two of our first grade referees, Rob Murdoch and Pat Rae. Both have contributed significantly to the Association on and off the paddock, and will be sorely missed. Pat leaves soon for Victoria due family illness, while Rob remains to help with referee development as a referee coach.

As President, I am indebted to the effort and commitment of the Management Committee. Despite the serious setback of the Honorary Secretary, Honorary Treasurer, and one committee member resigning immediately after being elected, the remainder of the Management Committee have worked together as a cohesive team to administer the affairs of the Association. I am deeply indebted to Peter Gofton, (Hon. Secretary/Administrator), and to Neill McCann (Hon. Treasurer) for volunteering their services. They stepped in at an especially difficult time. Sensitive negotiations were being entered into with the QRU and the Brisbane Rugby Committee in regard to referee remuneration and the loss of the fully funded Referee Administrator position at the QRU. Peter and Neill worked long hours to administer the Association and I thank them for their effort and diligence.

I am also indebted to Mark Logan, who as Vice-President and delegate to the BRC, ensured that there were effective lines of communication between the association and the clubs during the referee remuneration and funding negotiations. While Pat Cranshaw worked hard to ensure our mid-season and annual dinner were great successes. His good humour, enthusiasm and good organisation ensured these affairs went without a hitch. Well done Pat.

Thanks also to Michael Jennings for his resolve in gaining substantial government grants and new sponsors to enable the Association to continue developing and training our referees. While Michael Darcy used his organisation skills to make our interchange program the continuing success it has been in previous seasons. Flights were arranged and changed at short notice. Billets were acquired and referees met and transported. Well done both Michaels.

The Association is in a healthy financial position. The majority of our income is derived from sponsorship agreements, with some funding coming from the QRU specifically for the contracting of a Referee's Administrator. The Association cannot survive without good sponsors. Hence we are especially indebted to our major sponsor, the Queensland Rugby Union Club. This sponsorship enables the Association to continue to be in a sound financial position while providing a high level of service.

Of no less importance is the support given by our other sponsors. The referees received significant support from;

Throughout 2004 the Queensland Rugby Union has been very supportive of the Association, and I sincerely thank QRU CEO Theo Psaras, Gavin Head, Roger Plastow and Michael Backstrom for their time, advice and expert guidance through some difficult negotiations. Special thanks to Cole Barrett, QRU Referee Education Manager, for his help in accreditation and development of referees in Brisbane.

The achievements of our referees and referee coaches at State, National and International level during 2004 was again high. Andrew Cole and Scott Young as referees, and Ian Scotney as an assessor, represented the Association at Super 12 and Test level, while Paul Marks represented the Association at the IRB U/19 world championships in Durban. Association referees were also given the chance to grasp development opportunities provided by appointment to National Championships. Congratulations to Alastair Mould, Steve Leszczynski, Simon Moore and Michael Tutty on their selection.

This year the ARU have selected Cole Barrett and Ian Smith to take part in the Level 3 Referee Coach and Level 3 Referee courses for 2005. These two join a select group of referees and referee coaches from Queensland who have participated in this year long intensive study of rugby refereeing. Congratulations Cole and Ian.

The success of our referees is in large part due to the work of the Referee Coaching Director, Geoff Pegg. Geoff has continued the mentor-coaching program to develop our referees and referee coaches utilising the other Level 3 referee coaches and the referee coaching group. Many thanks to Geoff and the referee coaching group for their commitment and energy in improving the refereeing standards of all referees within the Association.

In 2004, the ARU set up a number of different referee squads beneath the National Panel. In 2005 the National Panel will consist of 3 Association referees, Andrew Cole, Scott Young, and Paul Marks. The National Academy will continue with Terry O'Connor as Academy Manager and Frank Meiklejohn as referee coach, and include referees Geoff Acton and Alastair

Mould. Greg Hinton remains part of the ARU Referees unit, refereeing at IRB 7s, and assisting the development of other referees including Steve Leszczynski and Simon Moore. Congratulations to you all on your selection.

Congratulations to all finals referees. By being selected in a finals panel, you have demonstrated your commitment to improving your refereeing performance. It was pleasing to observe the way each refereeing team went about the "finals process" as a team of three. It was obvious that all referees enjoyed refereeing in the finals, and that they were supportive of their mates even when they themselves may have missed out on a grand final appointment. Thanks also to the large number of referee coaches that volunteered their time to coach/select during the finals. Every finals referee benefited from your feedback and coaching.

Thanks are also due to those association members who represented the Association at Judicial hearings and appeals. The Management Committee thanks Geoff Gardiner, Tim Matthews, Paul Harding, Chris Newton, Mark Hogan and Marty Chalmers for volunteering their time by representing the Association at these hearings.

Our Association, in providing a referee service for our core business, Brisbane community rugby, could not have functioned as well as it has without the overwhelming support of all members. The Management Committee very much appreciates your dedication and commitment. Due to the willingness of the members to help out wherever they can, the Appointments Board was able to appoint to all games. The Management Committee also acknowledges the Appointments Board for their efforts in ensuring referees are at the games to which we appoint. Thanks to Mark Logan, who once again acted as Chairman, Frank Meiklejohn, Laurie Monaghan, Geoff Pegg, Tom Ryan, Brian O'Donnell and Chris Newton whose diligence and dedication ensured the appointments process was objective, fair and equitable. Well done.

Our Honorary Auditor, Mr. Leon Barrett, and our Honorary Solicitor, Paul Harding, are due our thanks for their time, effort and expert advice on our behalf.

In the New Year Honours list last January, Kevin Crowe, Life Member and former test referee, was awarded the Order of Australia Medal for services to rugby. He joins Graham Sheehan in being selected for this prestigious award. It recognises Kevin's significant contribution and commitment to rugby over a number of years. Congratulations Crowie.

Season 2004 was certainly a mix of highs and lows for the Association. At the end of the season it is clearly evident that as an association we have grown in character, commitment, and enthusiasm for the game of rugby despite the setbacks, criticism, and biases by some sections of the Brisbane rugby community. The Association has successfully worked with the QRU in facing the challenges thrown its way and continues to grow both in numbers and in the quality of refereeing produced by its members when officiating. Thanks you all for contributing to the Association's success.

Notes to and forming part of the Accounts

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements are a special purpose financial report prepared in order to provide accounts which satisfy the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Qld) 1981. The management committee has determined that the Association is a non-reporting entity and therefore there is no requirement to apply accounting standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements in the preparation and presentation of these statements.

The statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Qld) 1981. The statements are prepared on a cash basis, whereby items are bought to account as money is paid or received, from the records of the association. The are based on historical costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where as specifically stated, current valuation of non-current assets.

The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies adopted by the Queensland Rugby Referees Association (Brisbane) Incorporated in the preparation of the financial statements.

(a) Taxation

As of 1 July 2000, the association was registered with the ATO for GST purposes. It is a non-profit organisation that has voluntarily nominated for GST.

No provision has been made for income tax as the association is exempt from income tax under the provisions of section 23(g) of the Income Tax Assessment Act.

The Association was and still is not required to have a Tax File Number.

The Association collects and pays GST quarterly. A Business Activity Statement (BAS) is submitted to the ATO on a quarterly basis as required by the taxation legislation.

(b) Stock on Hand

All bar stock and referee's apparel are expensed in the year of purchase.

(c) Equipment

All equipment purchases are expensed in the year of purchase.

For control purposes such items have been listed on the register of noncurrent assets/chattels.

(d) GST collections and payments are excluded from the Income & Expenditure Statement in accordance with Commonwealth Government Legislation.

Statements of Accounting Concepts, Accounting Standards and consensus views of the Urgent Issues Group are not applicable to this special purpose financial reporting adopted by the Association.

The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.

2004 QRRA (BRISBANE) INC. APPOINTMENT'S BOARD REPORT

The Appointments Board for 2004 wars comprised of the following members:

- 1. Mark Logan Chairman
- 2. Frank Meiklejohn and Laurie Monaghan Pool One Appointments' Officers
- 3. Tom Ryan Pool Two Appointments Officer
- 4. Geoff Pegg Pool Two Referees Coaching Co-ordinator
- 5. Brian O'Donnell Pool Three(Juniors) Appointments Officer
- 6. Chris Newton Pool Three (Junior referees) Coaching Co-ordinator

The Appointments Board was responsible for referee appointments for rugby matches controlled by the Brisbane Rugby Committee, Brisbane Junior Rugby Union , the GPS ,AIC and TAS Sports Associations. When all five competitions were in full swing, the appointment's board appointed to nearly 220 rugby games each weekend.

This year the MC approved a new protocol for referees wanting to be considered for Pool One appointments, in particular Premier 1 games. The appointment's protocol that has existed for the previous 5 seasons was again utilised by the Pool 2 and 3 appointments officers. This pathway was adopted by the MC for two reasons. Firstly, because both panels had new appointments officers, namely Tom Ryan and Brian O'Donnell respectively, for the 2004 season. Secondly, the utilisation of Coaching Co-ordinators for each of these pools. This new innovation was implemented following a review of the referee coaching program undertaken during the 2003 season.

Every season throws up new challenges for the appointments board. This is the fourth year that I have chaired this committee during my six years on our associations MC. This by far has been the most rewarding. Whilst there are always a few in our association who feel they are hard done by in their appointments, I can state quite categorically that this years appointment processes have been the most thorough by far. Referees Coaches Group 2004

It is with a great deal of thanks to the referee coaches, that I highlight for members, the contribution they have made to referee development in Brisbane over the past season. The coaches have continued to update their skills through a series of six development meetings over the season, attended QRU sanctioned carnivals, represented our Association on interchanges and been ambassadors along with our referees to ARU championships. Additionally, many of the referee coaches undertake to actively referee and / or serve the Association and the wider Rugby community through participation in other areas. These include the various areas of appointments (QRU & QRRA), judiciaries or the QRRA Management Committee and for some the wider context of ARU appointments. They give their time freely to benefit refereeing. A fact sometimes missed in the busyness of our season.

Despite their many commitments across the Association and the wider Rugby community the referee coaches have managed to write 240 reports on 109 of our members. These figures are significantly down on the exceptional results of our coaching group from 2003. Factors explaining this decrease are the moving of two referee coaches from our Association to other areas that had contributed a total of 36 reports in 2003. Also, ten referee coaches who had submitted 40 reports in 2003 did not submit any reports in 2004. This is still an excellent achievement for 2004 with the Association having 172 active referee members. These figures equate that 64% of regular, active referee members have had at least one written report on them during 2004.

Summary by Referee Coach

An issue that surfaced during the season was that the demand for referees due to the number of games to appoint to did not allow the time for those referees who are also referee coaches to conduct any coaching activities. If the maximum number of referees to be sighted and reported on over the season is be achieved we will need to look closely at a number of strategies. These strategies should consider reducing the number of matches appointed to in these peak times and/or increasing the number of referee coaches and/or increasing the number of referees through recruitment. More referees could have been sighted and reported on had we not been placed in the position of having to appoint a number of referee coaches to referee fixtures. However I am sure the referee coaches in their return to the field enjoyed the experience.

Association records from the middle of the year indicate we have 14 Level I, 14 Level II and 6 Level III Referee Coaches in Brisbane. Peter Gofton is presently undertaking the Level III course this year while Cole Barrett is to undertake the Level III course which will be completed in 2005. Such is the growing strength of referee coaching in Brisbane, a fact that referees should feel confident about for their development in the future.

Finals' Series Appointments (Both Junior & Senior Grades are included)

QRRA Referee Coaches were appointed to all Under Age (Jnr.), Colts and Grade (Snr.) Finals series with the view to have them make a grand-final recommendation to the QRRA Appointments Board. A significant change

this year was that two coaches were appointed to all junior semi final games and one coach to each of the Grand Finals. With the Colts, Women and Senior grades, four coaches were appointed to all semi final games and the Grand Finals. The table below reflects those appointments and the contribution of various coaches to the process.

Interchange Report 2004

<u>Hamilton, New Zealand Interchange 20 – 29 2004:</u> Andrew Coorey and John Christophersen

Friday, August twentieth saw Andrew Coorey and John Christophersen board a Freedom Air flight bound for Hamilton. After an incident in customs (Andrew did mention that the cavity search was a bit rough, and just for bringing in a pair of dirty boots!) we arrived safely, and due to our late arrival time, spent the night at the Hamilton Airport Motor Inn. We were picked up early the next morning by a husband and wife referee team Paul and Lee Jeffrey, and Brian Alcock who put us strait to work touch judging an eighty kg game. I had the pleasure of refereeing St Pat's vs Gisborne Boys, a one sided affair with Gisborne winning comfortably, and both teams more or less refereeing themselves. Needless to say the tackler rolled away rather more hastily, and players were less inclined to leave their feet for the fear of a stud pattern or even puncture wounds imprinted on their back. Andrew had a much tighter affair, a three all draw between Napier boys and Te Aute (probably the game of the week), with both teams attempting field goals from forty metres out, and neither kickers getting the ball to leave the ground. Monday night we were invited to a get together (to welcome the touring referees) in the amazing facilities that the Waikato referees have at the stadium. I graced the congregations' presence with the standard 1.125 litre bottle of Bundaberg rum. Thanks to those who reminded me to take this, but I think you "forgot" to tell me that most kiwis don't like bundy!!! Needless to say, as one of only a very few that was drinking the liquid gold (as my fellow Brisbanian also abandoned the cause), it was a rather large night.

As stated previously refereeing in New Zealand is a culture shock. One of the many things that surprised me is the spectator "involvement". On Wednesday refereeing a game between New Plymouth and Te Aute, moved in goal to award a try to New Plymouth (one of many for that team on the day). After seeing the ball grounded and signalling that the try had been scored, I looked up only to see a spectator in in-goal only a foot from where I was standing! (Which was only just over the try line). It took me a few moments to work out exactly what was going on. When I asked him very courteously to leave the field (as he was a foot taller and about fifty kilograms heavier) he looked at me incredulously and exclaimed that he could see no reason to leave the field (in not so many words). Often the crowds would stand right on the sideline, or even on the five-metre line, which is one thing I will not miss about New Zealand Rugby.

We continued to referee most days without incident, and receiving much input on how we could improve. Finally the finals appointments were released with both Brisbane referees lucky enough to be selected to referee play off games. Andrew refereed St Pats Vs Canterbury Boys High, with St Pats winning a fiercely contested game. I was lucky enough to referee the game between Wellington College vs Rotorua, with Wellington just scraping home by 22-15. Having two hakas at the beginning and end of each game gets the hairs on the back of your neck standing on end, and has you on the balls of your feet as well.

On the Saturday we were given tickets by our host association to watch the Auckland vs Waikato NPC game in which everyone will be happy to here that Auckland got TROUNCED! Sunday was mostly a day of rest with a bit of retail therapy thrown in for good measure (mind you I woke at the gentlemanly hour of one pm...if that gives you an indication of the evening before!). Tired and a little over rugby, we returned to the Hamilton Motor Inn for the night so that we could leave at four a.m. (two a.m. our time) to make the six a.m. flight back over the ditch.

I would like to thank Paul and Lee Jeffrey for being magnificent hosts for both Andrew and I. They even leant me the car, which knowing the way I drive, is above anything that I would ever ask. Thankyou to Brian Alcock for suggesting and arranging the trip, and being there for even the most trivial of things (and the not so trivial). Brian also arranged for Andrew and I to stay at the Hamilton Motor Inn so we didn't have to wake up any earlier than needed. For this I am eternally grateful. Billy Heslop and the Head family also require mention, as they especially made an effort to take us out on the town, and to just feel like part of the family. Thanks also to the referee coaches, especially Kerry Petrie who came all the way from Auckland to come and see us referee. Last but not least I would like to thank our home association for selecting both Andrew and I for the tour, and Clarie Chappell performing miracles in getting me in some sort of condition to tour. It was invaluable to both of our refereeing, and a great place of the world made brilliant by the people of the Waikato Referees Association.

Newcastle, Australia Interchange 13 - 15 August 2004: Paul Twomey

I was pleasantly surprised when I received an interchange to Wellington, but to then be sent to Newcastle for Sandy MacNeill to cast his eye over me was a bit of a shock. None the less I was very excited to be going and couldn't wait for the opportunity.

Mark Eades had been sent to bring me into town and we had a great chat about the state of the game and the new faces who may replace our top referees when they depart from the elite scene. I was to stay with the Logan family who had sent their eldest son Jarryd to Brisbane only a few weeks earlier. I had arrived late on Friday night, so it was dinner and then to bed.

Alan Logan was the owner of a reasonably new club in Newcastle that had been enjoying much success on the rugby field. We spent much of the morning driving around town picking up the meat, bread and other things for the day of rugby ahead.

Alan was able to organise an U13 match early in the morning as a warm up for the afternoon, which was a relatively impressive affair. I had not controlled an U13 match for a while so at first the pace of the game was hard to get into, but I was able find myself and the game managed to control itself with an extremely positive attitude from both teams. This was the kind of junior match that I would love to see every weekend.

Jarryd and I shared strategies and stories for the rest of the morning until it was time to head over to my main game. The match was a premier colt's fixture between the first and fifth team on the ladder. It was to be a very competitive game between natural rivals Carlton and Mait.

I met Sandy before the game along with the day's Premier grade referee Paul Ryan. I would be touch judging for later in the afternoon. Sandy had few words to say before the game, but was keen for me to be as relaxed as possible and to referee as I would any other match. From the outset the game was going to be a very fast one with several line breaks from both sides early on. It was, however, only 5 hectic minutes before Carlton managed to break Maits scurrying defence and score under the posts. From here there was no turning back as Carlton ran in try after try, often from within their own 22 after resisting sustained attacks.

The pace of the game never let up however, and there were some very tired players and one sore referee at the end of the game. The rock hard ground had ensured my calf muscles hated me for the rest of the weekend.

In the end there was not a lot that could be said about the match, as the forward contest was disappointing. I had awarded only seven penalties in the entire game and Sandy felt that this demonstrated good management in the face of some very scrappy play, but we both agreed a better contest would have been a better indicator of my abilities.

Sandy was able to extract a lot of positives from the match and had some very fresh and worthwhile advice to improve my game. He wanted to see me try some different things during general play and to focus on ball line running and being in the correct position.

Sandy was then off and I ran the line for the Premier Grade match. The match was similar in result to my own but with a great deal more fireworks. It was 'old boys' day at the ground and the crowd became very passionate, particularly when it became clear the home side was not going to take victory.

My weekend finished with a very fine pub dinner at one of Newcastle's finest establishments. The Logan family treated me extremely well and I was able to get to know Jarryd fairly well. He has started on his journey to go as far as he can as a referee.

Fortunately Sandy was able to catch up with Barry Leask the next weekend and pass on much of what he had observed. Barry then made it out to my game and continue the work that Sandy had begun the weekend before. This re-enforcement and the opportunity for me to show improvement was probably the most valuable thing I got out of the whole experience.

I'd like to thank the association for extending me the opportunity to travel to Newcastle on interchange.

Doing this job would be a lot more difficult if not for the assistance of many members of the association. Steve Williamson was a fantastic help with many aspects of the interchange program. The most important was the work he did in organising the travel gear for all our out-bound referees and coaches. He was also fantastic with the transport arrangements for the guys while they were here.
